Activated on 1 Jul 1947. Inactivated on 1 Jul 1949. Consolidated (19 Sep 1985) with the 901 Air Refueling Squadron, Heavy, which was constituted on 7 Apr 1958. Activated on 1 Aug 1958. Inactivated on 2 Jul 1969. Redesignated as the 301 Fighter Squadron on 1 Dec 1999. Activated in the Reserve on 1 Jan 2000.

Redesignated: 302 Aerospace Rescue and Recovery Squadron on 18 Jan 1966; 302 Special Operations Squadron on 10 Apr 1974; 302 Tactical Fighter Squadron on 1 Jul 1987; 302 Fighter Squadron on 1 Feb 1992.

Discontinued, and inactivated, on 25 Jun 1966. Redesignated: 100th Air Refueling Squadron, Heavy, on 19 Sep 1985; 100th Flying Training Squadron on 29 Aug 1989. Activated on 1 Sep 1989. Inactivated on 1 Apr 1993. Activated in the Reserve on 1 Apr 1999.
